## ENGLISH, B.A

### REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

For admission to the English, B.A. major, students must earn an overall GPA of 2.4 or better, and must complete classes articulated with the following UC Merced courses prior to admission:

Choose two of the following courses. One course must be from course numbers ENG 50 to ENG 90.

- ENG 17, ENG 18, ENG 20, ENG 21, ENG 30, ENG 31, ENG 32 (or CCST 60, or SPAN 60), ENG 33, ENG 50, ENG 51, ENG 52, ENG 54, ENG 55, ENG 56, ENG 57, ENG 58, ENG 59, ENG 62, ENG 64, ENG 65, ENG 66, ENG 67, ENG 71, ENG 90

**\*\* If you have not completed the articulated courses, you must complete at least two UC Transferable English, Literature, or English Literature courses. These cannot include English composition courses. Examples of acceptable courses include:**

- Major Authors
- Chicano/Asian-American/African-American/Native American Literature
- A Genre
- A historical Period
- Introduction to Literature

Transfer students seeking fall admission should have the following completed by the end of the spring term preceding fall enrollment at UC Merced:

1. All minimum admission requirements including appropriate courses in math and the equivalent of WRI 1 and WRI 10 (see articulation by department for approved course equivalencies for math and writing).
2. All major preparation requirements as stated above.

Applicants are encouraged to clear any No Pass, D, or F letter grade received in UC Transfer course. Applicants are most competitive in the Admissions Process with fewer withdrawals and/or repeated course work in major preparation.

All course work must be completed with a 'C' or better.

Following these guidelines will assist you to be more competitive for admission to your UC Merced major.
